Introduction

- Since October 2011 we have been making major changes to the way we collect household waste.
- The new service is designed to help residents recycle more, help the environment and save money.
- Sending waste to landfill cannot carry on forever space is running out and costs are increasing.







What has changed?

- Wider range of recycling collected from the kerbside.
- Bins provided for all types of waste offering greater capacity to recycle more.
- More efficient routes introduced to save on miles travelled by our collection trucks.
- **Grey rubbish bins** emptied once every 2 weeks.
- Green bins instead of smaller green bags to increase paper and card recycling.







What has changed?

- Brown bins now provided to majority of households for recycling garden waste and/or food waste.
- Black kitchen caddies given to all households with a brown bin.
- Compostable liners provided to make food waste recycling cleaner and easier.
- Shared recycling facilities in place for tenants and residents of flats and apartments.







Where are we now?

- Well done residents of Bury thank you for increasing the amount you recycle.
- Bury now recycles 46% up from just below 28%.
- Bury 3rd best in Greater Manchester league table (previously next to last).
- In the top ten most improved councils last year.
- Saved over £1 million in waste collection and waste disposal costs.







Where are we now?

12 months after major changes:

- Less waste going to landfill 15,882 tonnes.
- More brown bin recycling 4,270 tonnes.
- More blue bin recycling 1,213 tonnes.
- More green bin recycling 3,390 tonnes.







Why recycle more?

- It costs £210 per tonne to get rid of grey bin waste at landfill around £8 million per year.
- It only costs £55 per tonne to turn brown bin waste into valuable compost.
- We get £25 per tonne for recycling items in blue and green bins.







Where do we need to get to?

- An improved recycling rate of 50% or more this will save at least £800,000 and help protect other council services.
- Around 2,800 more tonnes of recycling will get us to 50% or more (that's a few extra recycling items each week).







How will we get there?

If every household recycles:

- one extra glass bottle this will save over £6,000 and keep 27 tonnes of waste out of landfill;
- one extra TV guide or catalogue this will save over £8,000 and keep 35 tonnes of waste out of landfill;
- one extra glass jar this will save almost £6,500 and keep nearly 28 tonnes of waste out of landfill.







What we are doing

- Providing on-street recycling bins in town centres.
- Providing recycling centres in parks.
- Increasing recycling at schools and in council buildings.
- Increasing commercial waste recycling.







What we are doing

- Door to door canvassing in low participation areas.
- Promotional campaigns locally and in partnership with Greater Manchester. (Outdoor advertising, targeted communications, online, media releases, events, etc.)













What you can do

- Make recycling a part of your daily life.
- Know what you can and can't recycle.
- Keep at least 50% of your waste out of landfill.
- Request extra bins if you need them.
- Downsize your grey bin for free.
- Spread the word councillors and community leaders to champion recycling.







In a nutshell:

- Bury can recycle 50% or more if everyone does their bit.
- We know it can be done Stockport already recycles 65% (the most in Greater Manchester).
- Every household and every item really does count!
