### RTF.231 DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

### RTF.232 MINUTES

### It was agreed:

That the Minutes of the last meeting of the Township Forum held on 5 June, 2013 be approved as a correct record and signed by the Chair.

### RTF.233 BURY PUBLICATION CORE STRATEGY - NOTIFICATION OF FORTHCOMING CONSULTATION

The Township Forum received a presentation from David Wiggins, Principle Officer, Development Planning (Neighbourhoods and Communities Department) regarding the Council's Core Strategy consultation. It was reported that The Core Strategy would be a key document at the heart of Bury's Local Plan, setting out the long-term vision for the future development of the Borough to 2029 and would contain strategic policies that are required to deliver that vision.

The Consultation would run for six weeks from 2 August to 13 September, 2013 and would be submitted to the Secretary of State for the Environment in December, 2013. An examination of the Strategy will take place in March 2014 and it is anticipated that the final Core Strategy would be adopted in September, 2014.

The audience were invited to ask questions/make comments:-

• Concerns that Radcliffe would be accommodating a large percentage of the Borough's housing target when some areas of Radcliffe, in terms of the highways infrastructure, were already

struggling to cope.

• Concerns regarding the flood risks to areas set aside for housing redevelopment. Such as the former East Lancs Papermill site.

The Chair reported that the Borough's Flood Strategy would be considered at the next scheduled meeting of the Township Forum, as part of the consultation process.

- 2. That the information provided be noted.

### RTF.234 RADCLIFFE TOWNSHIP FORUM PLAN 2012-15 AND EQUALITY ANALYSIS FORM

The Township Co-ordinator submitted the draft Radcliffe Township Plan 2012-15, which outlined how the Forum would continue to make progress towards the vision for the Township in order to promote better outcomes for the social, health, economic and environmental well-being of the people within the Radcliffe Community. It was reported that all of the contributions made at the round-table discussions had been included in the draft Township Plan.

### RTF.236 FEEDBACK FROM CARNIVAL

A letter from the Chairperson of Abbey Close Tenants and Residents Association was submitted, for information, detailing a number of concerns in relation to anti-social behaviour experienced by some residents in the Abbey Close and Redbank Lodges areas of Radcliffe following the Radcliffe Carnival. The author of the letter was not in attendance at the Township Forum meeting and was therefore unable to answer questions from those present at the Township Forum meeting. Members of the Township Forum and attendees discussed the concerns raised and it was reported that a response to the letter had been made by the Anti-Social Behaviour Team in Radcliffe which had explained that the concerns raised had been shared with all partner agencies in the area.

### RTF.237 OPEN FORUM

The Chair invited questions, comments and representations from members of the public present at the meeting. Questions were asked and comments made on the issues detailed below. The Township Forum Coordinator undertook to obtain a reply to matters which could not be dealt with at the meeting.

- § A resident from Chapelfield raised a number of concerns relating to the deteriorating condition and poor state of repair of the highways on and around Stand Lane. The Township Co-ordinator reported that a response had been received from the Highways department confirming that there would be additional signage in place on Stand Lane.
- § Concern that there were no direct bus services from Radcliffe to Manchester whenever there were problems with the Metrolink.
- § A request for an update on the East Lancs Papermill gates.
- § Feedback requested on the Library consultation.
- § What had happened to the stained glass window, as part of the former Radcliffe Town Hall building (Walker Alan Window). It had been taken away for restoration, what had happened to it?
- § When was the Radcliffe Riverside School set to close?

### RTF.238 ADVISORY GROUP MEMBERS - UPDATE

The Chair, Colin Jones informed the meeting that there were currently 4 Advisory Group Member vacancies and welcomed applications from anyone interested in representing their constituted community group on the Township Forum. Colette Jones provided an update on the work of Friends of Close Park since the last meeting of the Forum, as follows:-

- Funding had been received for money for women's sports which would provide more gym equipment.
- The Party in the Park had been a great success. A suggestions box had been set up at the event and most feedback received had commented on the need for less empty properties in the area and greater activity provision for older teens. 80 gardening hampers had been given out to volunteers.
- HLF Funding update Stage 2 had been submitted. Things were looking positive!
- The Friends had set up a quiz for the public aimed at educating residents on the area in which they live.
- Update given on developments in the Ranger Service.

The meeting was informed of the funding available from the Community Development Fund – interested constituted groups could start applying for funding from the £8,000 available.

Radcliffe Township Forum, 17 July, 2013

Gill Stainthorpe, Withins Community Group, informed the meeting that gates had been fixed around the fencing to the goit which would enable volunteers easier access to help clean the goit.

Congratulations were offered to Cllr Matt Bailey and Cllr Daisy Bailey on the safe arrival of their baby daughter.

### Who we are and what we do

Radcliffe Township Forum welcomes those who live, work, or have an interest in the area. The forum meets at local venues such as community venues and schools. These meetings are public meetings and we strongly encourage everyone to come along. Discussions are fed back to Bury Council and its partners for appropriate action.

Radcliffe Township Forum is a constituted council committee consisting of all the elected members representing our area and a co-opted advisory group of local representatives from the business community, voluntary organisations and community groups. There are up to nine members on each Advisory Group and a place is also reserved for a young person's representative.

The Forum empowers our communities, promotes the debate of local issues and brings decision making closer to our residents. It seeks to harness the many strengths and assets we have in place here in Radcliffe, including local groups, strong community networks, talented young people, charities and voluntary groups, to work through these issues as a strong and committed partnership.

### Some facts about Radcliffe

**Demography:** Bury has a population of 185,060 (2011 Census Data), of these, approximately 34,189 live in Radcliffe. Radcliffe has a high proportion of the total population 23,800 (71.7%) who are of working age, well above the borough average of 63.9%. Jobseeker Allowance Claimants (JSA) in Radcliffe account for 27.7% of the total claimants in the borough.

**Deprivation:** In terms of measuring deprivation, England is split into small areas called lower super output areas (LSOA). Each LSOA represents approximately 1500 residents. Deprivation is measured over 7 domains: income, employment, health, disability, education and training, barriers to housing and services, living environment and crime. In England there are 32,482 LSOA. In the borough of Bury there are 120 LSOA. Each LSOA is given a ranking, with 1 being most deprived.

Within Radcliffe there are 7 out of the 20 LSOAs in the 25% most deprived in the country. Radcliffe Borough FC/Coronation Road is the most deprived LSAO in Radcliffe. It is within the 5% most deprived in the country overall. There is polarity within the township and deprivation is spatially concentrated around the centre of Radcliffe. Bradley Fold LSOA is within the 20% least deprived LSOA in the country.

**Closing the gap:** Radcliffe has some affluent areas but also pockets of deprivation and high levels of unemployment leading to inequalities which adversely affect the life chances of many people who live in them. These inequalities between our neighbourhoods mean poorer health, lower levels of education and skills, higher crime and unemployment for people living in these areas. The township plan aims to help close the gap so that the lives of those in the most deprived areas are improved.

**Our Assets:** Radcliffe has some beautiful parks and green spaces including Close Park and Outwood Forrest with active and enthusiastic friends groups to ensure that these spaces are well maintained. Radcliffe participates in Radcliffe in Bloom and last year was awarded a gold medal. It has a newly built health centre servicing the whole of Bury. There are active Tenants and Residents Association and Voluntary Organisations that are well represented on the Township Forum.

Current Position: Radcliffe has the highest levels of obesity in Reception Year and Year 6 pupils in the whole of the borough. About 1 in 8 (12%) of Reception Year Children are classified as obese. Almost 1 in 4 (24%) of Year 6 children are classified as obese

### **Improved Educational Attainment/Learning Opportunities**

Key Issues identified: The need to ensure that children are 'school ready'.

Current Position: Some Nursery School children are well below the expected standards and have poor communication skills.
