RTF.480 DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

There were no declarations of interest made at the meeting.

RTF.481 MINUTES

That the Minutes of the last meeting of the Township Forum held on 19 September, 2013 be approved as a correct record and signed by the Chair.

RTF.482 SPORTS DEVELOPMENT - 'I WILL IF YOU WILL'

Andrea Pilling from the Community Activator Team was introduced to the meeting. Andrea will be working in Radcliffe to promote sports initiatives in the area. Andrea informed the meeting of the Sport England initiative 'I Will if You Will', a £2.4m nationally funded year-long programme aimed at encouraging local women and girls aged 14+ to take up some form of sporting activity classes in Bury, to try and tackle the gender gap in sport. Some classes were starting to get underway in Bury Leisure sports centres and other community venues. Details of events were available on the Council's website. Andrea welcomed ideas from local community groups to get involved in this and other sport activities. The Team were in the process of working on a borough-wide bursary scheme and further details on applying for funding to support sports activities would be available on the Council's website in the very near future.

RTF.483 NHS - A HEALTHIER RADCLIFFE - THE RADCLIFFE PILOT

Dr Ajay Kotegaonkar and Dr Peter Thomas, two local GP's, attended the meeting to report on the new initiative in Radcliffe aimed at improving access to six GP surgery's in the area. This initiative would see opening hours extended to Monday to Friday, from 8 am to 8 pm and Saturday and Sunday from 8 am to 6 pm. These opening hours would be available to local people who are registered with the surgery's taking part in the scheme, the aim being to improve access to patients and therefore improve the health outcomes for local residents.

The Chair invited questions, comments and representations from members of the public present at the meeting:-

- Would the initiative also include minor operations being made available locally rather than local residents having to travel out of the borough?
 - Yes, it was hoped that minor operations could take place locally on a Day Care basis as the programme develops.
- Was this a borough-wide initiative under the Bury GP Federation?
 26 GP practices within Bury had come together as part of the support structure to help put the initial bid together for the scheme. Radcliffe had been chosen as a pilot area for the initiative.
- A Radcliffe resident, registered at a practice in Little Lever in Bolton, enquired if they would be able to access the extended health services in one of the participating GP surgeries in Radcliffe? Anyone registered at any other surgery which was not part of the scheme would need to continue to access the services at their registered surgery.
- What about access to services for local residents who are away from home?
 Any member of the public was and is able to access any walk-incentre for consultation and/or treatment.
- Would the Church Street facility become a 24/7 service? No, but there would be the opportunity to extend the opening hours at Church Street as the programme develops.
- Will this initiative lead to local people being able to access their GP more frequently than at present? Yes, hopefully.
- Will local pharmacies also be open until 8 pm?
 Yes, the surgeries are linking with local chemists in relation to the
 extended opening hours. It was reported that further information
 in relation to the scheme would be available on the internet soon.
 The GP's were currently working on an intense communications
 strategy and welcomed the support of local residents for the
 scheme. An update would be provided at a future meeting of the
 Township Forum.

RTF.484 LOCAL POLICE UPDATE

Inspector Mark Kenny provided an update on local police issues since the last meeting of the Township Forum:-

- § Between 1 April 2013 and 7 November 2013 there were 153 less victims of crime in the area, a reduction of approximately 16% on this time last year
- § Burglary 26 less victims
- § Vehicle crime 11 less reported crimes
- S Damage 46 less reported crimes
- S Robbery 3 more reported than this time last year.

Anti-social behaviour continued to be a particular area of challenge. Operational Treacle had seen some reductions to crime figures but there was still plenty to do. Inspector Kenny advised the meeting of the particular risk of seasonal crime at this time of year and to be extra vigilant at this time of year to put measures in place to avoid becoming a victim of opportunistic crime.

The Chair invited questions, comments and representations from members of the public present at the meeting:-

- Are there still Officers working from Radcliffe Station?
 Radcliffe Police Station was still operational, although there was no enquiry desk there.
- How do we protect the elderly and most vulnerable in terms of crime prevention?
 We need to work together to reduce the risks to the most vulnerable members of the community. Look out for elderly neighbours, particularly at this time of the year.
- Concerns regarding the potential for a serious road traffic accident at Bolton Rd.
 This highways issue would be passed on to the relevant highways

Andy Miller, representing the Youth Cabinet reported that the Youth Cabinet were currently working on ideas for a Youth Market to be held in Bury. Further details would be provided at the next meeting of the Forum.

Colette Jones provided an update on the work of Friends of Close Park since the last meeting of the Forum, as follows:-

- The HLF dig was now coming to an end. There would be an open weekend this Saturday and Sunday 9th /10th November.
- Brightside Brewery had agreed to create a beer for Radcliffe 'Tower Beer'
- 'Radcliffe Ring' cake a recipe was available on the 'Friends of..' Facebook page.
- Community Development Funding next round of bids would need to be submitted to the Bury 3rd Sector website by 10 January, 2014. Please see Colette if you need further information/advice.
- A crocus garden was being created in the Park for the Rotary Club.
- The Bluebell Wood initiative was coming soon volunteers needed please!
- Ongoing insurance issues hoping these would be sorted soon.

Barbara Law from Chapelfield Village Association informed the meeting of the new Stand Lane Reform Church choir. Radcliffe had won a Gold Medal in the North West in Bloom "Grow Your Own" competition.

RTF.488 OPEN FORUM

The Chair invited questions, comments and representations from members of the public present at the meeting. Questions were asked and comments made on the issues detailed below. The Township Forum Coordinator undertook to obtain a reply to matters which could not be dealt with at the meeting.

- The communal bins on Coronation Road needed to be removed immediately due to issues with daily fly tipping.
- Abbey Close residents discussed the anti-social behaviour experienced by residents following the fair on the day of the last Carnival.
- Members of the Radcliffe Independence Party raised the issue of the Christmas lights in Radcliffe following a recent report in the Radcliffe Times. Councillor Isherwood informed the meeting that the lights, purchased by the Authority in 2009, were currently in storage following a decision made by the Council two years ago to withdraw them as part of a borough-wide savings programme at that time. There was no guarantee that the lights would be re-installed due to the increased financial constraints on the Authority. The cost to test the lights and erect them would be £4,800. Local traders had been informed of the cost and were welcome to make a financial contribution towards this budget. Any local traders would be able to apply for a grant towards the costs involved and it was reported that an application had been received on 7 November. It was also reported that Christmas lights in other areas of the Borough were privately funded.
- It was reported that United Utilities would soon be carrying out works on Church Street West leading to the closure of this road for approximately 40 weeks. Cllr Bailey raised concerns about whether or not adequate traffic management plans would be in place to deal with the traffic problems this closure will cause for local residents.
- A resident asked why money was being spent on Elton High School when Radcliffe was without a high school? Councillor Isherwood informed the meeting of the history behind the closure of Radcliffe Riverside School.

The Chair thanked the public for their attendance at the meeting and took the opportunity to inform residents of the Radcliffe Market Fun Day which would be held on 30 November from 10.30 am to 2 pm.

Who we are and what we do

Radcliffe Township Forum welcomes those who live, work, or have an interest in the area. The forum meets at local venues such as community venues and schools. These meetings are public meetings and we strongly encourage everyone to come along. Discussions are fed back to Bury Council and its partners for appropriate action.

Radcliffe Township Forum is a constituted council committee consisting of all the elected members representing our area and a co-opted advisory group of local representatives from the business community, voluntary organisations and community groups. There are up to nine members on each Advisory Group and a place is also reserved for a young person's representative.

The Forum empowers our communities, promotes the debate of local issues and brings decision making closer to our residents. It seeks to harness the many strengths and assets we have in place here in Radcliffe, including local groups, strong community networks, talented young people, charities and voluntary groups, to work through these issues as a strong and committed partnership.

Some facts about Radcliffe

Demography: Bury has a population of 185,060 (2011 Census Data), of these, approximately 34,189 live in Radcliffe. Radcliffe has a high proportion of the total population 23,800 (71.7%) who are of working age, well above the borough average of 63.9%. Jobseeker Allowance Claimants (JSA) in Radcliffe account for 27.7% of the total claimants in the borough.

Deprivation: In terms of measuring deprivation, England is split into small areas called lower super output areas (LSOA). Each LSOA represents approximately 1500 residents. Deprivation is measured over 7 domains: income, employment, health, disability, education and training, barriers to housing and services, living environment and crime. In England there are 32,482 LSOA. In the borough of Bury there are 120 LSOA. Each LSOA is given a ranking, with 1 being most deprived.

Within Radcliffe there are 7 out of the 20 LSOAs in the 25% most deprived in the country. Radcliffe Borough FC/Coronation Road is the most deprived LSAO in Radcliffe. It is within the 5% most deprived in the country overall. There is polarity within the township and deprivation is spatially concentrated around the centre of Radcliffe. Bradley Fold LSOA is within the 20% least deprived LSOA in the country.

Closing the gap: Radcliffe has some affluent areas but also pockets of deprivation and high levels of unemployment leading to inequalities which adversely affect the life chances of many people who live in them. These inequalities between our neighbourhoods mean poorer health, lower levels of education and skills, higher crime and unemployment for people living in these areas. The township plan aims to help close the gap so that the lives of those in the most deprived areas are improved.

Our Assets: Radcliffe has some beautiful parks and green spaces including Close Park and Outwood Forrest with active and enthusiastic friends groups to ensure that these spaces are well maintained. Radcliffe participates in Radcliffe in Bloom and last year was awarded a gold medal. It has a newly built health centre servicing the whole of Bury. There are active Tenants and Residents Association and Voluntary Organisations that are well represented on the Township Forum.

Improved Health and Wellbeing Outcomes

Key Issues identified: To help improve the health and wellbeing of Radcliffe residents and work across the Children's Centre broad agenda to support children and families.

Current Position: Radcliffe has the highest levels of obesity in Reception Year and Year 6 pupils in the whole of the borough. About 1 in 8 (12%) of Reception Year Children are classified as obese. Almost 1 in 4 (24%) of Year 6 children are classified as obese

Improved Educational Attainment/Learning Opportunities

Key Issues identified: The need to ensure that children are 'school ready'.

Current Position: Some Nursery School children are well below the expected standards and have poor communication skills.

Radcliffe Township Forum aims to promote better outcomes for the social, health, economic, and environmental well being of people within our community.

Improved Public Transport links

Key Issues identified: Lack of a transport link from Ainsworth to the health centre in Tottington due to the relocation of the GP to the centre.

Key Issues identified: To promote the positive side of Radcliffe. To make more use of the parks and open spaces and the need to improve Community Engagement and Town Centre Regeneration.

Current Position: Some people have a negative view of the Radcliffe area.

Sightlines are not perfect especially when cars are parked right up to the junction but I do not feel its bad enough to justify parking restrictions when taking into account the width of Rectory Lane, traffic flows and speeds and there being are no reported accidents. Drivers, could if they wish, avoid turning out of Howard Street by going around the back of number 3 - 13 Rectory Lane and turn out at the junction which is at the side of 13 Rectory Lane. Visibility is slightly better here. Finally, any parking restrictions would displace parking further into residential areas causing more problems for residents. Regards,

I write with reference to your email dated 27 September 2013 on behalf of a resident of Stand Lane, and apologise for the delay in my response.
The site has been visited and the concerns investigated. It is apparent that there is a bus stop clearway in place on Stand Lane outside no. 181. This restriction prevents vehicles from stopping between the hours of 7am and 11pm. If vehicles are parked in the bus stop during these hours they are in contravention of the restriction. I have passed the location to Parking Services in order that they can hotspot the area for enforcement of any contravention of the restriction.
With regards to the bus stop on the opposite side of the road (outside 240 Stand Lane) there are currently no restrictions preventing parking. It is apparent that parking does take place at this location, particularly at school start and finish times.
A number of years ago a consultation was carried out with the intention of installing a bus stop clearway in the lay-by. However, due to objections received at the time the proposal was never implemented. It is likely that should such a proposal be resurrected there would be similar objections.
I will however arrange to highlight the issues surrounding parking in the vicinity of the bus stop to residents, and get their views regarding the possibility of reconsidering the introduction of a bus stop clearway.

Further Update Christine, I write to update you with reference to my email dated 29 October 2013 regarding issues with parking at a bus stop at the above location. Observations would suggest that parking at the bus stop is generally only noticeable at school start and finish times when parking in the general area is busier. It is appreciated that there may be some parking in the lay-by in an evening by residents as some of the properties rely on on-street parking. Taking into account the short term nature of the parking associated with the school, and combined with the fact that residents would be opposed to any restrictions due to the fact some rely on on-street parking, unfortunately it is not considered appropriate to introduce a bus stop clearway at this location. I trust the above information is of use to you.
