### BETF.492 MATTERS ARISING

In respect of Minute BETF.333, The Chair, Councillor Holt reported that the Council were in contact with the Developers concerning street names/numbering in the Pimhole area.

### BETF. 493 POLICE UPDATE

Sergeant Matt Doyle and Andy Bigland, Police Community Support Officer attended the meeting to provide members of the Township Forum with an update in respect of policing issues within Bury East. The following information was reported:

- Inspector Eddison had now returned to oversee the Bury North Division.
- PACT meetings remain a priority and continue to take place in Pimhole and Topping Fold
- Regular "Priority" meetings and Joint Engagement meetings were taking place to identify and tackle issues affecting the local community.

In response to a question from a Rod Boardall in relation to dangerous cycling on the pavement in the Heywood Street area, Andy Bigland explained that discretion was exercised by the Police on this issue but fixed penalties can be issued.

In response to a question from Jimmy Hill, Andy Bigland stressed the continued value of Homewatch Schemes and explained his aim to try and interlink with PACT meetings.

During discussion of this item, Andy Bigland highlighted that the majority of his current workload involved visits to vulnerable premises following the recent terrorist attacks in Paris

### BETF.494 HIGHWAYS UPDATE

The Chair, Councillor Holt, reported that an update from Highways would be provided at the next meeting of the Forum.

### BETF.495 ILLEGAL MONEY LENDING WEEK OF ACTION

Rachel Henry, Anti-Social Behaviour Co-ordinator, attended the meeting to raise awareness of the upcoming Illegal Money Lending Week of Action.

The Bury Organised Crime Team undertakes regular weeks of action on specific areas. During week Commencing 30<sup>th</sup> November a press campaign will concentrate on reaching vulnerable people who may be susceptible to

loan sharks in the run up to the Christmas period. Partnership work with the Police, Six Town Housing and Trading Standards will be carried out to warn of the dangers of illegal money lending and promote alternatives such as Credit Unions.

During discussion of this item, Jimmy Hill requested that whole areas could become no cold calling zones with signs posted on lamp posts. Councillor Kelly explained that such measures required all residents of the area concerned to give their consent.

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## Introduction

- Recognition that the funding we receive from central government continues to reduce
- A realisation that residents' needs are changing, demands are increasing, and expectations are high
- Understanding that the Council, its employees and its partners will have to work differently in future
- Commitment to deliver best outcomes with resources available

## Summary

- For 2016/17, we estimate we will have to cut £11.6 million from our budgets.
- This is because our core funding is being reduced by 10.75% (but this won't be confirmed until February)
- We estimate that our funding will be cut by over 30% in the next 4 years.
- We cannot underestimate the size and scale of the challenge. This is on top of £54 million we have lost since 2010
- The Council will need to prioritise services covering its legal obligations and its priorities set out in our "Vision, Purpose & Values" document
- Our priorities are to look after the vulnerable; promote a strong local economy and be a good place to live and invest

## Impact

- Service Changes can't rule out closures and/or a reduced range of services in future years
- Explore alternative ways of delivering services and greater use of Partnership working
- Increased waiting times and/or reduced quality of service
- Limits to what we can afford to do as a Council
- A different relationship with our residents understanding what the Council can (& can't) do
- Greater use of technology, e.g. our new transactional website.




## 2016/17 - Why More Cuts?

- Bury still receives a poor settlement compared to similar Authorities and we are lobbying the Government for changes
- We also face cuts to a number of grants we receive, e.g. Education Services, Benefits Admin Grant
- We face new burdens, e.g. Apprenticeship Levy, Employers National Insurance, Living Wage
- In addition to reduced funding, the Council faces pressures, e.g. User demand and expectations
- Finally we still face considerable uncertainty following the localisation of Business Rates – where we now share income (and losses) with the Government, and ultimately this will move to 100%, and the cessation of Central Government support to Local Authorities



### Who we are and what we do

Bury East Township Forum welcomes those who live, work, or have an interest in the area. The Forum meets at local venues such as community centres and schools. These meetings are public meetings and we strongly encourage everyone to come along. Discussions are fed back to Bury Council and its partners for appropriate action.

Bury East Township Forum is a constituted council committee consisting of all the elected members representing our area and a co-opted advisory group of local representatives from the business community, voluntary organisations and community groups. There are up to nine members on each Advisory Group and a place is also reserved for a young person's representative.

The forum empowers our communities, promotes the debate of local issues and brings decision making closer to our residents. It seeks to harness the many strengths and assets we have in place here in Bury East, including local groups, strong community networks, talented young people, charities and voluntary groups, to work through these issues as a strong and committed partnership.

## Some facts about Bury East

**Demography:** Bury has a population of 186,500. Of these, approximately 34,047 live in Bury East. Of the population of Bury East 57.1% are Christian, 17.8% are Muslim and 17.8% have no religion or do not say what religion they are.

**Deprivation:** In terms of measuring deprivation, England is split into small areas called super output areas (LSOA). Each LSOA represents approximately 1500 residents. Deprivation is measured over 7 domains: income, employment, health, disability, education and training, barriers to housing and services, living environment and crime. In England there are 32,482 LSOAs. In the borough of Bury there are 120 LSOAs. Each LSOA is given a ranking, with 1 being most deprived.

Many areas of Bury East are consistently in the 20% most deprived super output areas in the country (52.3%). Bury East has 5 LSOA's in the top 10% of most deprived LSOA's in Bury and 4 in the top 10% of most deprived in England. Chesham Fold is in the 1% most deprived nationally.

**Closing the gap:** Deprivation levels are a major concern to us and recent data shows conclusively that Bury East suffers higher than average levels of health inequalities compared with the other Townships in Bury. Inequalities between our neighbourhoods mean poorer health, lower levels of education and skills, higher crime and unemployment for people living in Bury East. Our Township Plan aims to close the gap so that the lives of those in the most deprived areas are improved.

**Our Assets:** Bury East has much to be proud of, it is a popular place to live; it has some beautiful parks and green spaces such as Openshaw Park and active and enthusiastic Friends Groups. The area is diverse and different religions and cultures are celebrated. The area has also seen significant levels of investment in recent times, in particular around the Pimhole area.

We seek to harness the many strengths and assets we have in place here in Bury East, including local groups, strong community networks, talented young people, charities, voluntary groups and community buildings, so that together we can work as a strong and committed partnership. Bury East Township Forum aims to promote better outcomes for the social, health, economic, and environmental well being of people within our community.

We can achieve this by working together to achieve a number of key outcomes:

## Together we can achieve more!

### **Key Outcomes:**

Our Plan will contribute to the following outcomes:

### **Improved Employment Opportunities**

Key Issues identified: The need for more apprenticeships and improved pathways to work for younger residents (16-24yr olds).

Current Position: June 2014 figures show there are 960 JSA claimants in Bury East, accounting for 31% of the total claimants in Bury.

Bury East has the highest number of youth (JSA) claimants (285)

### **Educational Attainment/Learning**

Key Issues identified: The need to ensure that children are school ready.

Current Position: Some Nursery School Children are well below the expected standards and have poor communication skills.

### **Improved Health and Wellbeing**

Key Issues identified: Main issues identified focus on Town Centre alcohol issues and hospital admissions related to alcohol. Areas of concern also exist around mental health and the impact of worklessness on this issue.

Current Position: Bury East has the highest number of alcohol related hospital admissions within the borough (975). East ward has the highest proportion of ESA claimants in the borough and figures show that 43% of ESA claims are due to mental health issues.

### **Improved Community Safety**

In Bury East significant issues exist around alcohol related anti-social behaviour (ASB), with the main concentration around the Town Centre. Perceptions of crime continue to be relatively high which indicates that more needs to be done to reassure people.

Bury East Township Forum aims to promote better outcomes for the social, health, economic, and environmental well being of people within our community.

We can achieve this by working together to achieve a number of key outcomes:

### **Community Pride & Belonging**

In Bury East we have a diverse community with residents from different cultures and religions.

The Bury Council Community Cohesion Plan has now been agreed and published. We have limited representation in the Township Forum from the different faith groups in Bury East.

### Making a difference

We will measure our performance as follows:

- We will monitor the action plan which will support delivery of these outcomes (an updated action plan will be shared at each Township Forum meeting)
- Bi-annual performance reports in relation to the above outcomes (presented to our Township Forum)

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Bury Council Township Forum Report



The Council has allocated £8,000 to each Township Forum to be allocated through a sub group of the Township forum four times a year in June, September, November and March. A maximum of £250 individual grant is available for formally constituted organisations.

Additionally, a borough-wide allocation of £8,000 is available for "cross-ward" applications for activity that takes place across more than one ward. The "cross-ward" applications are determined by the Council's Small Grants Panel.

Organisations applying for funding should be running projects which address at least one of the following priorities or one of those detailed in the Township plans:

- Improved employment opportunities
- Improved Community and Safety
- Improved Health and Well being
- Learning Opportunities for local residents
- Community Cohesion, Community Pride and belonging
- Environmental improvements

This report details the applications received to date including the October round of funding. The first round of applications was approved by the Small Grants Panel as there was insufficient time to form sub group of the Township Forums before the applications had to be approved.
