Where reviews arise and the licensing authority determines that the crime prevention objective is being undermined through the premises being used to further crimes, it is expected that revocation of the licence – even in the first instance – should be seriously considered.

#### **LICENSING ACT 2003**

### CONDITIONS ATTACHED TO THE GRANT OF THIS LICENCE

This licence is granted subject to any Mandatory Conditions imposed by the Licensing Act 2003, Embedded Conditions carried across on conversion of your previously held Justices Licence, Conditions Converted from any previously held Public Entertainments Licence, Conditions volunteered on the application form to be undertaken by the applicant and where necessary, Conditions imposed by the Licensing Authority in order to promote the Licensing Objectives.

#### 1. **Mandatory Conditions:**

- No supply of alcohol may be made under the Premises Licence at a time а when there is no Designated Premises Supervisor (DPS) in respect of the Premises Licence OR at a time when the Designated Premises Supervisor does not hold a Personal Licence or his/her Personal Licence has been suspended.

Premier Off Licence is a general convenience store which has been licensed for the retail sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises under the authority of a Premises Licence granted by Bury Council on 5<sup>th</sup> June 2008.

Since that date Mr Mohammed Ayyaz Khan of 12 Wellington Road, Bury has been the holder of the Premises Licence and the Designated Premises Supervisor (DPS).

On the 29<sup>th</sup> May 2008, the Licensing Hearings Panel attached the following conditions to the Premises Licence following representations being made to the Premises Licence application by local residents and Greater Manchester Police regarding youth anti-social behaviour in the area and underage drinking.

- That all alcohol containers in which alcohol is available for sale from the premises be uniquely marked in a manner approved and agreed by Greater Manchester Police.
- 2. That the following alcoholic drinks be kept behind the counter or in a place where customers do not have direct access to those products without the assistance of a member of staff, namely:
  - (i) All spirits, flavoured spirits, alco pops (i.e. spirit based drinks mixed with soft drinks / flavoured juice etc. which will include and not be limited to products such as "Bacardi Breezers" and similar products);
  - (ii) Cider
  - (iii) Lager
- 3. That a person who is a Personal Licence Holder or the Designated Premises
  Supervisor be on the premises at all times at which alcohol products are sold;
- 4. That alcohol be sold between the hours of 09.00 to 22.00hrs.

Mr Khan offered to have the conditions put on his licence that would restrict the types of alcohol that can be on open display and to alcohol products being sold from

his shop being uniquely and permanently marked. He also told the Panel that he would only employ staff who had undertaken the training that would enable them to become a Designated Premises Supervisor.

Licence condition 3 was later altered at the request of Mr and with agreement by Greater Manchester Police to state that a Personal Licence Holder must be on the premises Thursday, Friday and Saturday between the hours of 4pm and 11pm as Mr stated that to have a Personal Licence Holder on the premises at all times would not be financially viable.

The following licence conditions were also volunteered by Mr on the Operating Schedule as part of his Premises Licence Application.

- 1 CCTV system to be maintained and tapes to be safely retained for a minimum period of 31 days for viewing purposes by the authorities, including the police. Cameras shall encompass both internal and external areas of the premises.
- 2 Management and staff will use their best endeavours to prevent persons loitering outside the premises.
- 3 Fire extinguisher checks will be made and inspected on an annual basis.
- 4 To ensure regular and adequate refuse collections from the premises.
- 5 A challenge '21' scheme will be operated at the premises the only form of valid ID being passport, photo driving licence or PASS hologram ID card.
- 6 To compile and maintain a refusal book containing records of instances/persons who have been refused the sale of alcohol on the basis of their perceived age.
- 7 Documented staff training to be given to all staff concerned in sale of alcohol, this training to include under age and drunkenness.

Complaints were received in May and June 2010 regarding youths purchasing alcohol from Premier Off Licence. As a result of this a joint operation took place between

Greater Manchester Police and Licensing Enforcement Officers on 5<sup>th</sup> June 2010. A 17 year old male was apprehended outside the shop in possession of 4 cans of lager. However due to a problem with the shops CCTV Greater Manchester Police could not identify the member of staff who sold the alcohol.

On the 20<sup>th</sup> December 2011 PC Watson from Greater Manchester Police visited the premises and issued a fixed penalty notice to a member of staff, for the sale of alcohol to a 16 year old. The notice was accepted by Mr and and was spoken to by Greater Manchester Police to remind him of his responsibilities as the DPS.

On the 4<sup>th</sup> July 2014 a compliance check by Licensing Enforcement Officers found that no entries had been recorded in the refusals register since February 2014. Mr was confronted over this issue and he admitted that other refusals had been made but had not been recorded.

At the request of Trading Standards a compliance check by Licensing Enforcement Officers was carried out on the 27<sup>th</sup> July 2017 at 8pm (a Friday evening) and found a number of breaches of licence conditions. Mr was not present in the shop. A member of staff named Dean was working and informed us that Mr had to attend A&E. Dean was not a Personal Licence Holder. This was a breach of the licence condition stating that a Personal Licence Holder must be on the premises between 4pm-11pm Thursday, Friday and Saturday. A check of the alcohol bottles on the shelves revealed that very few of the bottles had been marked.

Licensing Enforcement Officers re-visited the shop on 31<sup>st</sup> July 2017. Mr was again not present and Dean was working. Mr was spoken to on the phone and agreed to be present at the shop at 11am the following day. The visit took place and Mr was present as arranged. The refusals register was inspected and consisted of a tea stained notepad with illegible writing. There were two entries one from 2015 and one from 2017. When questioned as to what staff he currently employed he

named himself, Dean and who was currently in Pakistan. He was reminded of the conditions on his licence requiring a Personal Licence Holder being present and to marking his bottles. He admitted that he had been slack at ensuring this was done. An inspection of his CCTV revealed that the system was working and recording but Mr was unable to work the system to show us CCTV footage from Friday evening.

On the 3<sup>rd</sup> April 2018 two PCSO's from Greater Manchester Police stopped two girls coming out of the shop. One was 13 years old and one 14 years old. Both had just purchased single cigarettes from the shop for 50p each. The PCSO's went into the shop and the man behind the counter produced an open pack from under the counter which was illicit, non-duty paid. He told the Officers that his boss, the shop owner, tells him to sell the cigarettes to anyone. The cigarettes were seized by the Officers.

Following complaints regarding the sale of illicit cigarettes a Multi-Agency visit took place at the premises on 5<sup>th</sup> June 2018 involving partners from Licensing, Greater Manchester Police, Environmental Health, Trading Standards, Greater Manchester Fire Service, the Electricity Board and Immigration. Mr was not present but his son, who was working in the shop, telephoned him and he later attended. The majority of bottles were found to be marked however there was evidence of a person sleeping in the rear of the shop and the electricity was turned off at the shop due to safety concerns over the meter.

A second multi agency visit by the same partners was carried out on 16<sup>th</sup> October 2018. Me was not present and working in the shop was the from an address in Fallowfield, Manchester. This visit involved the use of a tobacco dog trained to locate, amongst other things illicit tobacco and cigarettes. A bag found in the rear of the shop was found to contain a change of clothes, two condoms and a number of packets of illicit cigarettes and hand rolling tobacco. A jacket under the counter was also found to contain illicit cigarettes. Mr

these items belonged to him. Under the counter was also found an open pack of cigarettes and an open pack of condoms. The bed in the store room was still present. Not all the bottles on the shelves were marked and cider and lager were present on the shelves not behind the counter as per the licence conditions (see photograph). Mr. was questioned as to what age a person could purchase alcohol and he stated 21 and 21 to buy cigarettes. He confirmed that he had received no training.

On 27<sup>th</sup> November 2018 Mr attended the Town Hall for an interview under PACE at the request of Kelly Halligan, Senior Trading Standards Officer and myself. He was questioned regarding the breaches of condition of his Premises Licence and the illicit cigarettes found on the Premises. He stated that he had two members of staff other than himself and his son who worked at the shop on an ad hoc basis when home from University. The staff are admitted that he had issues with youths loitering outside the shop and causing issues inside the premises. Mr to stated that he had spoken to Mr about the presence of the illicit cigarettes in his possession. When questioned as to why there was an open pack of condoms under the counter Mr did not have an answer for this. When questioned as to Mr selling single cigarettes to the underage girls he denied knowledge of this. He said that he had fired Mr as he caught him stealing cigarettes from the shop and was being too friendly with the kids and serving to underage.

It is felt that there are a number of issues with the Premises that are not being controlled by Mr as the Premises Licence Holder and the DPS.

The premises is in an area where Greater Manchester Police are aware of issues regarding CSE. Therefore an open pack of cigarettes being found under the counter together with youths being stopped having purchased single cigarettes and an open pack of condoms under the counter are facts that must be taken into consideration when deciding if the premises is being run in line with the licensing objectives of the Licensing Act 2003 to prevent crime and disorder and protect children from harm.

# To prevent crime and disorder

Please state your reasons:

Chesham Road Convenience, also known as Premier Off Licence is a general convenience store, which is currently licenced by Bury Councils Licensing Department. The Premises Licence Holder and Designated Premises Supervisor at the time of our visits was and still is Mohammed Khan.

In April 2018, I received some information from Greater Manchester Police, regarding an incident that had occurred, on the 3<sup>rd</sup> April 2018. On this date two Police community Support Officers employed by Greater Manchester Police on the Moorside beat, were on patrol in the Chesham road area. It was around 18.20 when the officers witnessed a group of youths

leaving the Convenience store at 29 Chesham Road, the officers noticed that one of the female youths had an unlit cigarette in her hand. The officers stopped the youths a couple of streets further down, and spoke to the girl who gave her name and date of birth, which made her 14 years old on the day she purchased the cigarette. She told the officers she had paid 50 pence for 1 cigarette.

The officers entered the premises and behind the counter was he admitted selling the cigarettes to the girls, and produced the packet he had got them from and 2 unopened packets, from under the counter, not from the gantries behind. The packets where branded gold mount and had no UK duty paid stamps on the packet. When asked where the cigarettes had come from, he said the cigarettes were delivered by an unknown person, and his boss, the owner Mr Mohammed tells him to sell the cigarettes to anyone. The cigarettes were seized by the police officers. The officers have provided written witness statements, they are enclosed with this representation.

The keeping of none duty paid cigarettes on a licenced premises is an offence contrary to section 144 of the Licensing Act 2003. The maximum penalty for this offence is a fine of £1000. To supply or possess for supply the cigarettes, either singly or in the incorrect packaging would also be an offence under Regulation 12 of the Consumer Protection From Unfair Trading Regulations 2008, as the trader is stating or otherwise creating the impression that the product can legally be sold when it cannot. The penalty for this offence is on summary a fine not exceeding the statutory maximum, and on indictment, a fine or imprisonment not

exceeding 2 year or both. The supply of cigarettes not in the correct packaging is an offence under regulation 15 of The Standardised Packaging of Tobacco Products Regulations 2015. The penalty for producing or supplying tobacco products in breach of these regulations is on summary conviction to imprisonment for a term not exceeding three months, or a fine, or both, or on conviction on indictment to imprisonment for a term not exceeding 2 years, or a fine, or both. The supply of single cigarettes is also an offence under the The Standardised Packaging of Tobacco Products Regulations 2015, as regulation 4 (8) sates they have to be sold in 20's. The penalty is as stated above. The supply of products which do not contain the correct health warnings, or health warnings that are not in the correct format is an offence under regulation 48. The penalty is the same as that in the Standardised packaging regulations.

On the 5<sup>th</sup> June 2018, a multi-agency visit was carried out to the premises, with partners from Greater Manchester Police, the Fire Service, Immigration, Housing Standards, Environmental Health, Licensing and Electricity North West. Mr. Khan was not present, but his son was, the electricity meter was removed on the grounds of safety/abstraction, and there was evidence of someone sleeping in the room to the rear of the premises.

In August and September further complaints were received that the premises was selling cigarettes and tobacco from abroad, and selling to people under age. On the 16<sup>th</sup> October 2018, as part of a multi-agency day of action with partners, from Greater Manchester Police, Immigration, the Fire Service, Housing Standards, Licensing, Electricity North West and Wagtails, carried out a visit to the premises. Working in the shop on this

occasion was a location. The tobacco searching dog found some tobacco in a bag out back which the employee claimed was his and also found some in a jacket under the counter, again Mr said it was his. Found in the bag was a foreign labelled packet of Amber Leaf, and 20 Marlboro not in Standardised packaging. In the jacket under the counter was 20 Richmond and 20 Marlboro again nether in Standardised packaging. Also under the counter was an open packet of 20 JPS that was Standardised packaging but there was only 10 cigarettes in the packet. Also behind the counter was an open packet of condoms. Mr was asked about the age to buy alcohol and tobacco and he said 21 to both, he also admitted to having had no training.

The cigarettes have been examined by the relevant trade mark holders and been confirmed as counterfeit, witness statements to this affect are enclosed. The hand rolling tobacco is foreign labelled.

The possession of counterfeit cigarettes would be an offence under Section 92 of the Trade Marks Act 1994, and the offences for none standardised packaging and incorrectly labelled cigarettes and tobacco would be under regulation 15 of The Standardised Packaging of Tobacco Products Regulations 2015.

On the 27<sup>th</sup> November, Mr Khan attended the Town Hall for an interview under caution at the request of Laura Jones, Deputy Licensing Officer and myself. He was questioned regarding the breaching of his premises licence and also about illicit tobacco. He said he had two member of staff neither had a personal licence. He said he had issues with youths accumulating outside

Document Pa	his premises. Mr Khan said he had spoken to Mr about the illicit tobacco in his possession. When asked about the open packet of condoms he had no answer as to why they were there. Mr Khan claimed he knew nothing of his previous employee Mr selling single illicit cigarettes to underage girls. He also said that Mr had been sacked for stealing from the shop.  It is felt that there are a number of issues with the premises which are not being controlled adequately by Mr Khan. An open packet of cigarettes under the counter, along with youths being stopped having purchased single, illicit cigarettes and an open packet of condoms under the counter, are facts which need taking into consideration when deciding if the premises is being run in line with the licensing objectives and the Licensing Act 2003, to

A lo a tl	PC Simms goes on to state that Anti-Social Behaviour is a big ssue regarding the store. Most evenings there are gangs of 8 + youths outside the store and over spilling into the road. Although there is a park nearby the youths are drawn to this ocation. They are regularly told to move on however they lways return. The store continues to be a drain on her time and nat of other officers. PC Simms remarks that while she is ealing with issues surrounding this store she not dealing with ictims of crime and other demanding areas on her beat.

# THE PROTECTION OF CHILDREN FROM HARM

We continue to receive complaints of underage sales of alcohol and tobacco. In April 2018, 2 officers stopped a 13 year old female and a 14 year old female leaving the premises who confirmed that they had just purchased single cigarettes from there for 50p each. It has been noted that on our visits to the shop they have failed to mark a number alcohol containers as specified in their conditions.

Recently a member of staff has invited children, known to frequent the store, to their home address which is near to the store. These youths have failed to return to their own address resulting in missing reports being submitted to Greater Manchester Police by their guardians. The harbouring of children is a serious issue and raised questions regarding the sensibility of that member of staff and raises the potential for further incidents to be reported.

## Section 3B - Suggestions/Further information

It is the opinion of the Chief Constable of Greater Manchester Police that the premises licence holder, Mr Mohammed Khan, is not always in full control of his premises or staff. Although he personally may not be responsible for some of the issues described within the review application it is his responsibility to ensure that the Licensing Objectives are being supported. It is clear that there are a number of poor choices being made, and over a number of years has failed to learn from the previous issues. The management of the shop is poor and it is noted that the Mr Khan is unable to provide a legitimate explanation for some of the issues discovered during the visits by Greater Manchester Police and other agencies.

It is important to note that Mr Khan has made a number of complaints to Greater Manchester Police regarding youths congregating or causing issues at his premises. While these appear to be legitimate reports, previous actions by Mr Khan and his staff members may have created the problem by causing these youths to frequent his store in the first.

#### 1.0 BACKGROUND

- 1.1 The Licensing Act 2003 and the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations are the relevant legislation.
- 1.2 The Panel will make a decision on the day of the hearing and the parties will be notified subsequently of the decision and the reasons for it by letter from the Licensing Office.
- 1.3 At the time of the submission of the review application on the 6<sup>th</sup> December 2018, the Premises Licence in respect of Killon Street Off Licence, 26 Price Street, Bury, BL9 7EB is held by Raja Naveed Aijaz, 29 Cardigan Drive, Bury, BL9 9LG. Mr Aijaz is also the Designated Premises Supervisor (DPS).
- 1.4 On the 19<sup>th</sup> December 2018, the Licensing Authority received an application to transfer the premises licence with immediate effect in to the name of Mr Waqas Mahmood, 110 Rutland Drive, Bury, BL9 9ER. On the same day, an application to vary the Designated premises Supervisor with immediate effect was received to make Mr Waqas Mahmood the designated premises supervisor.
- 1.5 The Licensing Authority did not receive any representations during the representation period in respect of the application to transfer the Premises licence or the application to vary the designated premises supervisor from Greater Manchester Police. Therefore the premises licence has been transferred and the designated premises licence supervisor varied into the name of Mr Waqas Mahmmod.

#### 2.0 PROCEDURE

- 2.1 The Responsible Authority has complied with all the necessary procedural requirements laid down by the Act.
- 2.2 As part of the statutory process the Responsible Bodies and interested parties are entitled to make representations in relation to the review of a licence. The Licensing Authority has given Notice of the application by placing a Notice on the premises, at the Council Offices and on the Council web site. Where further representations are made by either the Responsible Authorities or from local residents / businesses and not withdrawn, Members are required to determine them.
- 2.3 Representations must be relevant to the licensing objectives defined within the Act. The objectives are:
  - a) the prevention of crime and disorder
  - b) public safety
  - c) prevention of public nuisance and
  - d) protection of children from harm

Where reviews arise and the licensing authority determines that the crime prevention objective is being undermined through the premises being used to further crimes, it is expected that revocation of the licence – even in the first instance – should be seriously considered.

#### **LICENSING ACT 2003**

### **CONDITIONS ATTACHED TO THE GRANT OF THIS LICENCE**

This licence is granted subject to any **Mandatory Conditions** imposed by the Licensing Act 2003, **and conditions volunteered** on the application form to be undertaken by the applicant and where necessary, **conditions imposed by the Licensing Authority** in order to promote the Licensing Objectives.

#### **Mandatory Conditions:**

- No supply of alcohol may be made under the Premises Licence at a time when there is no Designated Premises Supervisor (DPS) in respect of the Premises Licence OR at a time when the Designated Premises Supervisor does not hold a Personal Licence or his/her Personal Licence has been suspended.
- b Every supply of alcohol under the Premises Licence must be made or authorized by a person who holds a Personal Licence.

## Mandatory Conditions pursuant to The Licensing Act 2003 Mandatory Licensing Conditions (Amendment) Order 2014

- **3.** (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
- (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
- (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either:
- (a) a holographic mark, or
- (b) an ultraviolet feature.

#### **Definition:**

## Responsible person - as defined by section 153 (4) Licensing Act 2003

- (a) In relation to a licensed premises -
- (i) the holder of a premises licence in relation to a premises
- (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) under such a licence

- (iii) any individual aged 18 or over who is authorised for the purposes of this section by such a holder or supervisor.
- (b) In relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables him to prevent the supply in question.

#### The Licensing Act 2003 (Mandatory Conditions) Order 2014

- 1. A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- 2. For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 1-
  - (a)"duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979
  - (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula-

$$P = D + (D \times V)$$

where-

- P is the permitted price,
- (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence-
  - (i) the holder of the premises licence,
  - the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
  - (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e)"value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- **3.** Where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that subparagraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- **4.** (1) Sub-paragraph (2) applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph2 on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
- (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

#### PREVENTION OF CRIME AND DISORDER

On the 19<sup>th</sup> July 2018, a visit was carried out to Killon Street Off Licence, 26 Price Street, Bury, BL97EB. The visit was part of a multi-agency day of action, involving partners from Environmental Health, Housing Standards, Licensing, Greater Manchester Police, Greater Manchester Fire Service, Immigration and North West Electricity. We visited the premises as we had received a complaint that illicit tobacco was being sold from under the counter. Whilst on the premises 665 cigarettes and 200g of hand rolling tobacco where seized, they were either counterfeit, non-duty paid or foreign labelled, stood on the floor under the counter was a half full bottle of vodka.

On the 23<sup>rd</sup> July 2018, I revisited the premises with Laura Jones from the Licensing service, whilst in the shop, Mr Aijaz was spoken to by Laura, who gave him a list of things to do.

On the 26<sup>th</sup> July I visited the shop again, accompanied by Laura Jones from Licensing, and Michelle Street from Housing Standards. Whilst in the shop we found various food items beyond their use by date, and beyond their best before dates.

The possession of non-duty paid tobacco is an offence contrary to Section 144 of the Licensing Act 2003. The maximum penalty for this offence is a fine of £1000. The possession of counterfeit tobacco and counterfeit cigarettes is a criminal offences under Section 92 of the Trade Marks Act 1994. Each item found is a separate offence, and the penalty for this offence is fine of up to £5000 or imprisonment. Food beyond its use by date, is deemed to be unsafe by virtue of Article 14(2) to (5) of Regulations (EC) No 178/2002, which is an offence under Regulation 19, of the Food Safety and Hygiene (England) Regulations 2013.

Please provide as much information as possible to support the application (please read guidance note 3)

This premise was visited in July as a result of intelligence received indicating that the shop was selling counterfeit or non-duty paid tobacco from under the counter. As a result of the intelligence, a multi-agency visit was carried out. After a search of the premises, tobacco was found under the shelving units which contained the slush machine within the shop and not on the cigarette gantry behind the till. Also under the counter units was found a half full bottle of vodka, and 2 open packets of cigarettes, an open packed of Richmond with 10 in the packet, and an open packet of pall mall with 15 in the packet. Whilst we were on the premises, the electricity was turned off due to an unsafe meter. The cigarettes and tobacco where seized. The man in the shop was called the sold the business 9 months ago, he also claimed he was only helping and didn't usually work in the shop.

On the 20th July, and Mr attended the licensing office and spoke to Mr Bridge. They were trying to transfer the licence form Mr to Mr Mr admitted that he had not been on the premises since the 4<sup>th</sup> February 2018 as that was when Mr took over the business, but no money had changed hands for the business.

On the 23<sup>rd</sup> July, samples of Richmond and Superkings cigarettes where sent to the trade mark holder for examination.

On the 23<sup>rd</sup> July, I revisited the premises with Laura Jones, from the Licensing department. On entering the premises there was a strong smell of cannabis, Mr. came to the premise and was given a long list of things to address.

On the  $26^{\text{th}}$  July, a witness statement was received from imperial tobacco, confirming the Richmond and superkings where counterfeit.

On the 26<sup>th</sup> July a further visit was carried out to the premises, with Laura Jones from licensing and Michelle street from housing Standards. Mr Alam was telephoned to come to the premises. Whilst on the premises we found a packet of bacon 20 days beyond its use by date, (the bacon was dated 6<sup>th</sup> July), 2 packets of meat where the packaging was blown but the date hadn't been reached, various cheese beyond their

use by date, cheese in date but with mould in the inside of the packaging, and various other food items including eggs beyond their best before dates. Mr was advised that all products needed checking. Mr said he had been managing the shop since February as he didn't have the finance to complete the sale, so he wasn't there full time and neither was Mr so only spot checks where done.

In section 11 of the Statutory guidence made under section 182 of the Licensing Act, it talks about certain criminal activity which should be treated as particularly serious. One of the items listed is the use of premises for the sale or storage of smuggled tobacco. Smuggled would include in this context, not duty paid, counterfeit and other grey market tobacco. Out of date food is deemed to be unsafe and an offence under the Food Safety Act 1990,


From the information given to us there appears to have been very little contact from the DPS/PL holder in the months leading up to the visit. An application to transfer the licence was submitted on the 20<sup>th</sup> July 2018, but was subsequently withdrawn after an objection from the police was put in. Mr has no direct day to day responsibility for the running of the business, and therefore criminal offences have been committed and contraband goods have been supplied.

The premises isin an area where Greater Manchester Police are aware of issues regarding CSE. Therefore open packets of cigaretes being found under the counter together with open bottles of spirits, are facts that must be taken into consideration when deciding if the premises is being run in line with the licensing objectives of the Licensing Act 2003 to prevent crime and disorder and protect children from harm.

Killon Street Off Licence is a general convenience store which has been licensed for the retail sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises under the authority of a Premises Licence granted by Bury Council on the 24<sup>th</sup> November 2005.

has been named as the Premises Licence Holder and Designated Premises Supervisor since the licence was transferred to him on 18<sup>th</sup> August 2015.

The licence has the following conditions;

- 1. CCTV to continue to be installed and tapes to be retained for a period of 28 days for viewing by the authorities, including the police.
- 2. Proof of identity/age should be required and satisfied before allowing entry of person(s) who appear may be under 18 years of age and who wish to purchase/consume alcohol.

The hours that alcohol may be sold as stated on the licence are Monday-Sunday 8am-11pm.

On the 9<sup>th</sup> July 2018 I took a complaint from a resident of Price Street regarding the Premises known as Killon Street Off Licence. The complaint was that the premises was operating outside the hours of its licence with the front door open for trading after midnight and that there was a flow of people from the shop and the flat above at late hours.

The complaint led to an evening compliance check whilst on enforcement duties at 11.35pm on Friday 13th July. The shop was closed at this time.

I was part of a multi- agency exercise that visited the shop on 19<sup>th</sup> July 2018. Mr was not present at the shop. Working behind the counter was a Mr He said that Mr had sold the shop 9 months ago and his new "boss" was called

The summary of the premises licence was not on display as is a requirement under s57(3) of the Licensing Act 2003. There was no visible CCTV in place.

When requested a refusals register could not be produced. Challenge 25 signage that was on display had been covered up.

I served an enforcement notice to state that no alcohol should be sold until the breaches of the conditions of the licence had been rectified and the licence had been transferred and a new DPS put in place.

The following day I had a telephone conversation with Mr who informed me that he had, had no responsibility for the shop since February 2018 and that it was being run on a trial basis by but no money had actually changed hands for sale purposes. A transfer application was submitted on 20<sup>th</sup> July 2018 to make the Premises Licence Holder. Mr had agreed to stay on as DPS whilst Mr obtained his personal licence. Mr stated that written authorisation was on display in the shop from him to other members of staff for them to sell alcohol on his behalf.

On the 23<sup>rd</sup> July I revisited the shop with Kelly Halligan, Senior Trading Standards Officer. was working in the shop. I questioned him as to where the authorisation was that had stated was on display. He was not aware of this and had to phone Mr. When this was located it named as the Assistant Manager yet he was unaware where the written authorisation for him to sell alcohol was located. The CCTV system was working but only recording for 3 days. I spoke to Mr. on the phone whilst in the shop and asked him where the refusals register was. He stated that he had it with him. I informed him that it needed to be in the shop in order to be used if necessary.

Revisited on 26<sup>th</sup> July together with Kelly Halligan and Michelle Street, Environmental Health Officer. was again present in the shop. Refusals book still not on the premises.

O PREVENT CRIME AND DISORDER	Inspector for Weights and Measures Kelly Halligan has submitted an application on behalf of Bury Council for a premises licence review in respect of Killon Street Off Licence, 26 Price Street, Bury BL9 7EB.
	We have noted the contents of the application, and would like to add the following in support of a licence revocation.
	We concur that we have engaged in a multi-agency visit to the premises on 19 <sup>th</sup> July 2018 and have had a number of concerns which have been referenced in Ms Halligans' application. We

fully support the comments made in the application and wish to add some additional points below.

It is noted that since the review application was submitted a licence transfer application has been received by Bury Council. This application is in the name of who we understand has previously been the owner of Tabi's Off Licence, Wash Lane, Bury and is still in the ownership of the family.

In January 2012, whilst Mr was in control of the premises, a warrant was executed at the store regarding the employment of illegal workers. One over stayer was located and arrested by the UK Border Agency. Also at this time a number of bottles of counterfeit vodka were located under the counter. Mr was later interviewed by Ms Halligan for this offence and we understand that this was the second occasion in 3 months that counterfeit alcohol was located here.

Importantly in this case purchase invoices relating to 26 Price Street were found at this location. When questioned by the attending officers Mr denied any link to this premises despite the discovery. It was believed by officers at the time that stock purchases were being shared between the two stores.

#### PUBLIC SAFETY

As previously noted, the new licensee has a previous history of being in the possession of counterfeit alcohol on Licensed premises. In this respect it is likely that the poor management may continue at Killon Street Off Licence.

# THE PROTECTION OF CHILDREN FROM HARM

The premises appear to have suffered from particularly poor management practices in recent months with little or no training given to staff. During the multi-agency visit in July 2018, a male found working behind the counter claimed not to be employed and was in fact helping out a relative who was not the licensee. He had not received any training regarding the sale of alcohol. We also note Ms Halligan's comments regarding the suspected sale of counterfeit cigarettes as single cigarettes, a practice of attraction particularly to children. It is the opinion of Greater Manchester Police that poor management of licensed premises puts vulnerable members of the community at risk.
