The Council has provided vouchers to support the families of those children who qualified for Free School Meals over the school holidays of Christmas, February half term, Easter, June half term and the full summer holidays. Provision of these FSM vouchers has accounted for £1.059m of the grants received. The Council engaged with the Bury Community Support Network to seek insight from the network of food banks and wider community sector partners on the nature of demand presenting currently and to co-develop means of utilising this resource to target prevention and early intervention activity within the borough. The BCSN were trusted referrers into the Winter Support Grant, and subsequent schemes, locally for the identification of individuals to receive welfare advice and guidance alongside provision of food/fuel vouchers. Further targeted work was carried out with STH, the Councils Revenues Division and the Hubs. 		We are currently upgrading the network from analogue cameras to high-definition digital cameras, a programme that will take a couple of years and follows the installation of the local full fibre network throughout the borough.
