

# Winter Vaccinations Update

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## WHAT ARE THE MAIN 'WINTER' VACCINES?

#### Influenza:

- Seasonal virus normally circulating between December and February.
- Causes significant pressure on hospitals and serious care home outbreaks.
- Annual vaccine campaign starting September (children) and October (adults)
- Vaccine eligibility: pregnant women, all children aged 2 or 3 years, school aged children (reception to year 11), children in clinical risk groups aged from 6, adults aged 18 to 65 in risk groups, all adults aged 65 and over.

#### COVID-19:

- Not yet seasonal have seen waves at all times during the year. Currently in a prolonged period of relatively low circulation.
- A wave in winter could add to hospital pressure and care home outbreaks.
- Twice yearly campaigns in April and October.
- Vaccine eligibility: adults aged 75 years and over, residents in care homes for older adults, individuals who are immunosuppressed aged 6 months and over.

# RSV (respiratory syncytial virus):

- Seasonal virus normally circulating October January.
- Causes significant hospital admissions mostly very young children and older adults.
- One-off vaccine (no seasonal campaign).
- Vaccine eligibility: pregnant women, adults aged 75-79.

#### Pneumococcal

- Common cause of bacterial pneumonia, can be secondary infection following infection with respiratory virus.
- Causes substantial hospital admissions and deaths in older adults. Can cause severe care home outbreaks.
- One off vaccine (no seasonal campaign)
- Vaccine eligibility: people aged 65 and over (normally on turning 65).



## **UPTAKE OF KEY VACCINES IN BURY**

## Influenza:

- 3<sup>rd</sup>/4<sup>th</sup> in Greater Manchester for older adults (improvement from 2022/23 – 2023/24) but declining uptake nationally.
- 5<sup>th</sup> in GM for at risk adults.

## COVID-19:

- 3<sup>rd</sup>/4<sup>th</sup> in GM for older adults, 5<sup>th</sup> for at risk adults.
- Declining uptake nationally (Spring uptake normally lower than Autumn/Winter).
- Eligible cohort reducing due to change in effectiveness of boosters (due to increasing population immunity).

## RSV:


• 7<sup>th</sup> in GM for older adults, 2<sup>nd</sup> for pregnant women (though coverage only 30%).

### Pneumococcal:

- Worst uptake in GM (2024/25 data not available, but improvement from 2021/22 – 2022/23). No more recent data available from ICB.
- Working to improve uptake with GP Fed & practices focusing on care home residents and older adults.

#### Coverage for adult immunisation programmes




